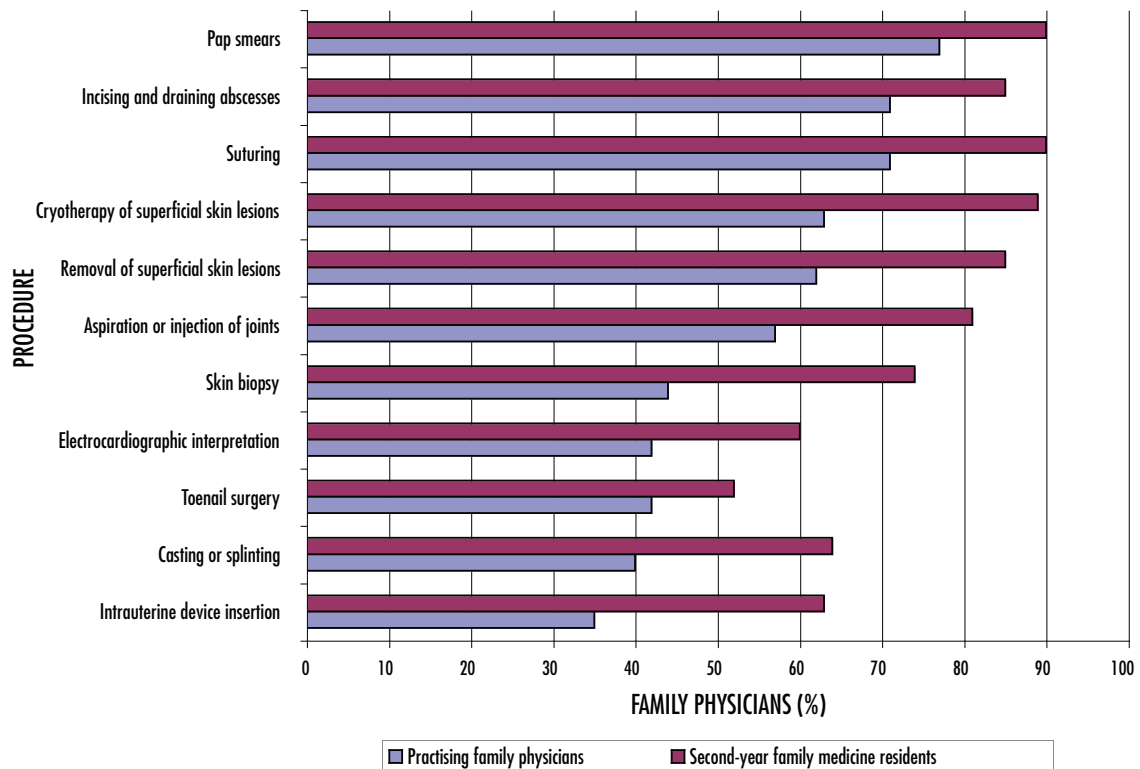

Procedures performed

The 2004 National Physician Survey (NPS) is a unique collaborative project of the College of Family Physicians of Canada, the Canadian Medical Association, and the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada. National-level estimates based on 2004 NPS results are considered accurate to within $\pm 0.9\%$ and $\pm 6.5\%$, 19 times out of 20 for practising family physicians and second-year family medicine residents, respectively.
