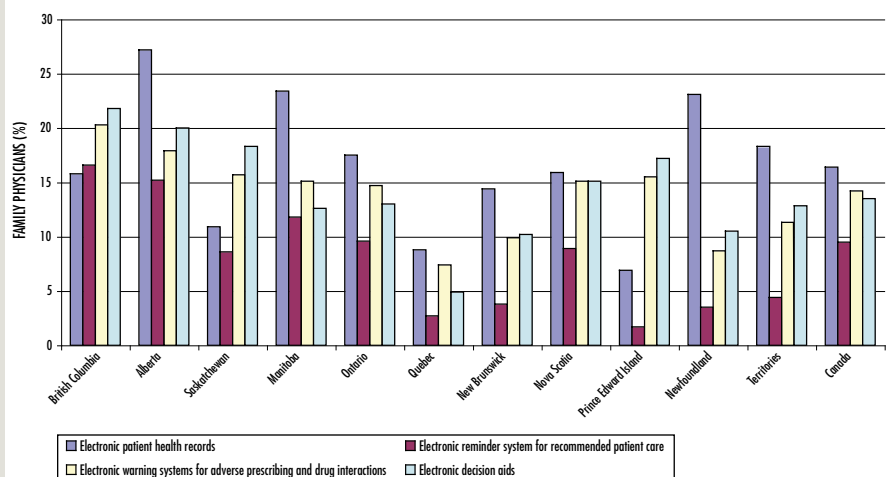
## Janus Snapshots

### Use of technology

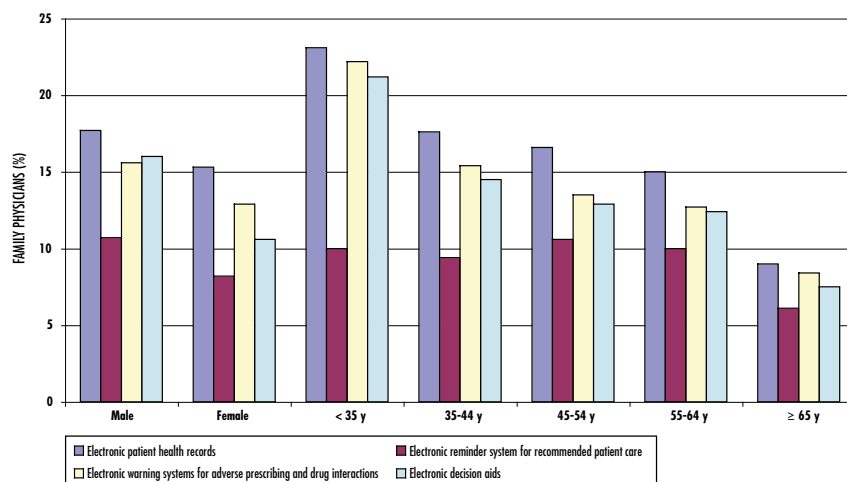
Family physicians were asked about their use of health information technology in their main patient-care settings. Results indicate differences by province or territory (Figure 1) and by sex and age (Figure 2).

The 2004 National Physician Survey (NPS) is a unique collaborative project of the College of Family Physicians of Canada, the Canadian Medical Association, and the
